

FUNDAMENTALS OF LIBERTY

a Rampart College home study program of assisted self-education

The "Fundamentals of Liberty" course is the culmination of thirteen years of research centered on the nature of man and his interactions with other individuals and organizations. It is filled with the facts and explanations underlying the philosophy of individual freedom. It can provide the increased knowledge and self-confidence you need to handle any daily situation, whether at home, in business, in your social life - anywhere!

The course contains information on a multitude of aspects of human liberty: the nature of the mind and how it operates, the nature of ownership, the nature of both voluntary and coercive means of organizing human energy; an analysis of the human record with special emphasis on such eras as the Industrial Revolution and the American story. It examines the nature of the market and economics, the nature of the state, and ways of dealing with the problems facing all of us today.

Here are some of the 52 lesson topics:

MOTIVATION

Four basic human drives. What prompts men to take action? What is the concept of self-sacrifice?

RESPONSIBILITY AND OBLIGATION

Does the individual have a responsibility to society? When is a person obligated to do something against his will?

HOW OWNERSHIP OCCURS

What is ownership? What is the relationship of ownership and property to human well-being?

THE QUESTION OF MORALITY

Is morality objective? Can morality be enforced? Is morality practical?

THE INDUSTRIAL REVOLUTION AND THE DEVELOPMENT OF ANTI-CAPITALIST PROPAGANDA

An historical review of the period that led to the development of the machine age, and of the social theories in voque at the time.

COMPETITION AND MONOPOLY

Does a free market inevitably lead to monopolies? A study of the economic principles in day-to-day activities.

THE ANTITRUST LAWS

Historic and contemporary views of antitrust legislation. The purpose and intent of the laws, and their results to date.

PRICES AND UNEMPLOYMENT

How the pricing system works. The causes of unemployment and high prices.

MONEY AND BANKING

The seemingly complex subject of money and banking, discussed in understandable terms. A complete explanation of the Federal Reserve System.

THE GREAT DEPRESSION

The period for The period from 1929 to 1940. The events leading to the depression of the thirties and the steps taken to cure it.

HISTORY IN CYCLES

A brief look at the development of various cultures.

FROM BABYLON TO STEAM

Economic and social advances. The creative energy of the individual and the societal influences.

THE CIVIL WAR

The view from the north and the view from the south. Economic and political influences of the period 1850 to 1870.

ORIGINS OF SOCIALIST THOUGHT

The meaning of collectivism/socialism and of individualism. A discussion of some of the most prominent contributors in the philosophic confrontation.

THE SOVIET UNION SINCE 1917

Has the Russian experiment worked? What was the economic condition following 1917? What is it now?

THE STRUCTURE - A CORRUPTED SYSTEM

A study of how men organize to get things done. Can individuals form together in groups and maintain their freedom and independence?

COMMUNICATION

Suggestions for developing the power to explain ideas without becoming boring or "preachy." Eighteen steps in communication.

Progressing through the lessons, students learn

- . why men and women act the way they do
- . how to spot inconsistencies in ideologies
- . how to separate the propaganda, the slanted journalism, from the facts
- . Why people fear a free society
- . how opinions are formed and changed
- . the difference between possession and ownership
- . the relationship between prices, costs, and profits
- . how to evaluate human organization
- . how to analyze current events with clear-headed detachment
- . how to assert opinions without fear of the disapproval of others
- . the facts needed to support one's conclusions
- . the ability to attract others to one's point of view
- . the difference between private capitalism and state capitalism
- . what kind of social organizations inhibit human liberty

FUNDAMENTALS OF LIBERTY

Students receive fifty-two lessons, which are mailed five at a time. At the end of each set of five lessons, accompanying quizzes are returned to the college for correction and comment. Students may raise all possible questions in connection with the material and will receive answers through correspondence with staff members. A certificate of successful completion will be awarded when it has been earned.

The full price of the course is \$175. There are two ways of paying:

- A. Send \$148.75 with the enrollment form. This provides for a discount of 15% for cash. (You save \$26.25.)
- B. Send \$37.50 now (\$20 deposit plus \$17.50 for the first set of lessons); then \$17.50 for each of nine (9) additional sets of lessons, making a total payment of \$175 plus the \$20 deposit. The deposit will be refunded upon completion of the course.
