# NO SHORTAGE OF DOCTORS - JUST MISPLACED M.D. 's

"Less than 56% of the physicians in the U.S. are available to provide medical care on a private fee-for-service basis. Even these physicians are harassed with mountainous government red tape..."

The Association of American Physicians and Surgeons recommends making thousands of physicians available for doctor-patient care by removing over 30,000 from the federal payroll. According to the AAPS, the

present U.S. ratio of one doctor for approximately 625 people is the most advantageous ratio for any major country in the world.

### PRICE FREEZE CHALLENGED IN LONDON

At least until March, 1973 no one has been prosecuted in England for upping prices without cause. In a deliberate attempt to boycott the freeze, the slick quarterly Freedom First has raised its price from 12½p to 15p. The magazine's new editor, Pauline Russell, says a representative from the Department of Trade and Industry price unit started by "telling me, more or less, not to be a naughty girl and to put the price down again next time. When I told him that we would be putting it up another 2p for the next issue and that the reason we were doing it was to make money, he warned me about what could happen." The London Financial Times reports: "Miss Russell is ready for this. Her editorial (... 'Surely the time has come to remove the shackles of coercion and to bring an end to the slave mentality...') concludes with an assurance that she is prepared to take full responsibility for the price rise and to face the consequences of her action." Entrepreneur Russell also runs a hamburger restaurant and a business in economic textbooks.
