R103-04. How Do You Know For Sure (Centers on how we know what we know, ideas, iphilosophy and the nature of reality), and Emotions and Motivation (Emotions and motivation of mankind; why he does what he does).

R105-06. Sacrifice and Molestation (Argues that human will is man's property, that imposed sacrifice is molestation) and Obligation and Responsibility (Illustrates that responsibility is the opposite of obligation; that a person is the owner of his action-responsible).

R107-08. A Definition Of Freedom (Gives a history of the origins of the word freedom, starting in 2000 b.c. with Ura Kagina) and Human Rights (Shows that property and human rights are identical, that all rights are related to ownership).

R109-10. Property and Ownership (Argues that property is an extension of owner's life, that mankind is both consumer and producer) Property Classifications (Insight into why human life is dependent on property, and the various types of property conditions).

R111-112. Ownership of Property (Shows the four types of property ownership arrangements, and who owns a piece of property in reality) and Collective Ownership (Insight into who really owns public property).

R113-14. Conflicts in Ownership (Who owns what, in issues of slavery, improperly marked boundaries, double claims and collective ownership) and How We Become Owners (Insight into three ways to win privileges and control over property).

R115-16. Value: What And How (Why human beings are value-centered; how values are determined subjectively; and discussion of Marx's labor/wage theories) and Production of Need (How we produce what we need with tools, human energy and rational thought).

R117-18. The Nature of Wealth (Argues that money is not wealth, only the medium of exchange) and Wealth And Politics (Focuses on political wealth; why it undermines the economy and causes inflation).

R119-20. What Is Money--Part I (Illustrates the development and history of money; and defines commodity, credit and flat money) and What Is Money-Part II (Centers on flat money that government creates, along with its history in the United States).

R121-22. What Is Banking? (History of banking, how it works and its misuse in to-

day's economy) and Gold And Banking (Insight into U.S. government's banking policy/system, and gold policies nationally and internationally; and why the U.S. abandoned the gold standard in 1933).

R123-24. Fears Of A Free Market (Why people generally fear an unregulated marketplace; fear of high prices and low wages) and The Fear Of High Prices (What causes prices to rise; why price is not set by cost; and a study of supply and demand

theory).

R125-26. The Fear Of Monopoly--Part I (Shows that under a totally free market system, monopolies, if they exist at all, will be harmless) and The Fear Of Monopolu-Part II (Insight into why the free market moves toward competition, instead of monopoly; and studies various types of competition).

R127-28. The Industrial Revolution--Part I (Studies the facts that caused the Industrial Revolution; and examines the social conditions of pre-Industrial Revolution) and The Industrial Revolution--Part II (Greater detail of the benefits arising

from increased wealth from industrialization in 1760-1830 England).

R129-30. The Industrial Revolution-Part III (Reviews some of the charges made against so-called heartless factory owners) and The Industrial Revolution--Part IV (Reviews the two Sadler Reports, the renowned one and the forgotten one).

R131-32. The Age Of The Robber Barons (Reviews the charges of monopoly and the effect of the wealthy on the economy) and The Great Depression (Insight into the role of the Federal Reserve System and intervention under Hoover and

Roosevelt).

R133-34. How We Serve Each Other (Insight into who makes the highest profit in a free market, what makes production, distribution and selling possible, and whether large populations per se stimulate production) and Economic Revolutions (Reasons for the dramatic advances brought about by the agrarian and industrial revolutions: and that a third revolution is in the offing).

R135-36. The Nature Of Government (Strips away the mythology surrounding the structure of political government) and The Source of Government Power (Why governments have been viewed as representative of the divine and social whole:

and why force and fraud are implicit in representative government).

R137-38. The Beginning Of American Independence (Why British colonies expanded in the New World, while Spanish growth was static; and compares the impetus and inspiration for the American and French Revolutions) and The American Revolution (Why the American Revolution was unique in man's history; also, why its inspirational documents had no legal status).

The Declaration Of Independence (Significant passages are analyzed, meanings are clarified; and why "property" was omitted from the list of rights) and The Communist Manifesto (Why the Manifesto calls for overthrowing social conditions; and why Marx sought to do away with private ownership of the tools of pro-

R141-42. Ethics In Collision (How should the good be determined; who makes the choice?) and Origins Of Socialist Thought (Why Plato sought the perfect society: Zeno, et al.; superior men. Why emphasis today is on feeling rather than on thinking).

R143-44. The Anarchists (History and philosophy of prominent socialist-anarchist in Europe and the individualist-anarchists in America) and The Communal Socialists (Insight into early American experiments in communal living from

Jamestown to present-day religious communes).

R145-46. The Communists (Studies the objectives and theories of Karl Marx: where he got his ideas; and where the first Communist government came to power in 1910) and The Fascists And Fabians (Centers on what is fascism, and goes into the history and methods of the Fabians in England).

Today's Revolution (Argues that most revolutions change rulers, not rulership; that the American Revolution was against authority per se, and unwilling to set up another rulership) and Getting It all Together (Nature of the marketplace in psychological terms, and reasons why people are interdependent on each other to live).

R149-50. Background To The Constitution (Reasons and history of why most colonists opposed the passage of the U.S. Constitution; why Jefferson was tricked by the federalists into leaving the 13 colonies) and The Constitution Revisited (Shows that the U.S. Constitution gives unlimited power to the federal government; also, quote from Patrick Henry, who opposed the Constitution).

R151-52. What Others Have Sald About Liberty (quotes from leading authors and leaders) and What Is The Right Amount Of Government (Case made for voluntary

society without coercion).

R153-54. Education -- Part I (Why education is important for freeling society) and Education -- Part II.

R155-56. Poverty (Why poverty is not a lack of money: and how poverty is created) and The First Secretary of Agriculture (Bibical story explaining the nature of farm subsidies and government).

R220. Leonard Read, Government & Inflation. In this 1959 speech, Read discusses inflation and hyper-inflation found in many countries, predicting higher inflation for the U.S. in the near future. Some time is spent on 19th Century England and the Corn Laws (60 minutes).

R221. Leonard Read, The History of FEE. Read details the history of the Foundation for Economic Education (FEE), which is basically a history of Read himself beginning in the late 1920's with a top job with the U.S. Chamber of Commerce

(90 minutes).

R222. Leonard Read, Creative Energy & Violence. Read discusses why any obstruction of creative energy inflicts penalties onto the general populace; and that there are two classes of people-people of love and people of violence (60 minutes).

R223. Leonard Read, Collective Defense. After two short workshop speeches by Freedom School students who attack government-operated national defense, Read takes his turn and defends collective/government defense on the grounds that a formal organization of society needs state-run national defense. Recorded in the early 1960's, Read's counter-arguments show the beginning stages of the early libertarian movement; and how the libertarian philosophy differs from conservatism

R224. Frank Chodorov, The Myth of Government. Chodorov, one of the early libertarian writers, shows that government is not of the people, but rather, a government of the bureaucrats, by the bureaucrats and for the bureaucrats (60 minutes).

R225. Frank Chodorov, History of Income Taxes, Historical view of taxes on income imposed by government, especially in the United States, starting in the late 18th century. Chodorov illustrates the unconstitutional and immoral nature of income taxes (60 minutes). (Continued on page 14)

"Government has never really said that they are going to protect us," contends LeFevre. From this 21/2 hour college lecture. LeFevre defines protection as "being safe" and shows that government provides citizens with laws of retaliation, not laws of protection. R226. **Frank Chodorov**, *U.S. Constitution and The Law*. Chodorov argues that the U.S. Constitution is outmoded, that Congress does not make legislative laws, and that the executive branch of government does not administer laws (90 minutes).

R227. Frank Chodorov, The New Deal. Discussion of the hard effects of Roosevelt's New Deal upon the liberty movement; and insight into those few individuals who broke with New Deal ideals (circa 1944) and fought for a new movement based on individualism (60 minutes).

R228. Oscar Cooley, The Spirit of Enterprise. Recorded in 1962, Cooley warns of the approaching "Welfare Mentality" that destroys individual initiative and the

willingness to improve oneself (60 minutes).

R229. **Percy Greaves,** Problems of Ignorance. Record in the late 1950's, Greaves outlines why the American people are moving away from fundamental principles that founded America. He explores several myths related to economics, and explains why all exchange/trade is fair in a free society (60 minutes).

R230. Robert LeFevre, Individual vs. the State. A strong, dramatic speech given at the "Left/Right Festival of Mind Liberation" in 1970 at USC. In front of a mixed crowd of Vietnam-era leftists, moderate conservatives and radical libertarians, LeFevre calls for an end to violence by both the U.S. government and student militants. Arguing that the state is only a concept, an idea, LeFevre warms that most revolutions resemble a turning wheel; that is, rulership revolves, changes, but nothing else. Calling for the end of coercion, LeFevre says that violence is government, and that only intelligence will defeat the forces of statecraft (60 minutes).

R231. Robert LeFevre vs. Philip Nicolaides, The Abortion Debate. Taped at Cal State Univ., Fullerton in July/1981, this debate contrasts the pro and cons of abortion by two libertarians (90 minutes).

R232. Leonard Liggio/Murray Rothbard, Libertarian Conference, Part I. Recorded at the famous Oct. 10-12, 1969 New York City Libertarian Conference. Liggio honors the career of Frank Chodorov; Rothbard tackles the economics of property rights (90 minutes). Note: Part I thru III are sometimes difficult to hear due to poor recording.
